
About the Bellforge Arts Center


Bellforge Arts Center – a regional multi-arts complex being built on the grounds of the former Medfield State Hospital – offers concerts, festivals, and community events, plus access to more than 200 miles of nature trails and outdoor recreation space. It's rare to find a place in our state with this magnificent array of features that can deliver truly transformational community benefits.

Currently, most of our programming takes place outdoors. However, once our buildings are renovated for the first phase of our development, the center will feature a 300-seat, flexible-use performance venue, 16 classrooms for visual and performing arts education, rehearsal space, and artist studios. A multi-phase approach to building will ultimately grow the center to include facilities and programming to support culinary arts, sustainable farming, artist housing, and more.













Our mission, vision, and values





Building community through community buildings

Ten years ago, the seeds of the Bellforge were planted when the town of Medfield purchased the Medfield State Hospital property. A dream was born to create a vibrant new regional arts center in the Chapel and Infirmary buildings. Much has happened since, and today we're on the verge of initiating the critical infrastructure work that will revive these unique, historic structures.





Much more than bricks and mortar

As we continue executing our strategy for revitalizing these buildings, we remember they must:

- Serve as inclusive gathering places:
 Through our programming and facilities,
 Bellforge is a welcoming place for all. (As
 New Englanders, we're also acutely aware
 of the need for flexible spaces that support programming in any conditions.)
- Facilitate the creation and sharing of art:

 Artists and guests will rely on us as their concert hall, gallery, studio, classroom, kitchen, and more.



A blueprint for success

We eagerly anticipate the day we throw our doors open as a fully operational multi-arts center. But we're also committed to moving at a thoughtful pace and doing things the right way by:

- Consulting the experts: We constantly solicit input from artists, guests, and communities from across our region, and we're several years into a planning process with the expert partners who will help us execute our construction efforts.
- Honoring the past: Time and the elements have taken a toll on portions of the buildings, but we are rebuilding. We're also mindful of our broader surroundings. For decades, Medfield State Hospital's innovative "Cottage Plan" layout was renowned for how it facilitated community, efficiency, and well-being all of which remain important to us today.

- Modernizing experiences: Whether it's
 fine-tuning acoustics, adding technology
 and infrastructure, or improving access and
 flexibility, we're committed to delivering
 exciting, entertaining, and comfortable
 experiences.
- Building connections: Bellforge unites people ... and buildings. Our plans include a new lobby to join the Chapel and Infirmary buildings, seamlessly integrated with the existing architecture. The lobby will be a meeting place and a literal connection between practice and performance spaces.
- Controlling costs: As a small but growing nonprofit, we're deeply committed to fiscal responsibility and deploying our resources in the right ways at the right times.



























Our growing reach, influence, and support

The center features artists from the "Bellforge Triangle" of Boston, Worcester, and Providence. While our region enjoys an abundance of first-rate artists and artist-teachers, it lacks sufficient creative space to work, rehearse, show, and perform. Bellforge provides vital settings and resources to showcase well-known artists and amplify marginalized voices.

The Bellforge's family of supporters continues to grow with new individual, foundation, and corporate donors each year. Institutional donors from this year included the Barr Foundation, Community Foundation for MetroWest, Ramsey McCluskey Family Foundation, and The Savage Family Foundation, among many others. The Bellforge Arts Center was also the recipient of a competitive grant from the Massachusetts Historic Preservation Program, administered by Preservation Massachusetts in partnership with The 1772 Foundation. Out of the 75 applications this year, the Bellforge was among just 16 finalists approved for funding.

Programming overview

From **April to October 2023**, Bellforge Arts Center showcased an impressive range of performances and community events:

- We hosted over 100 performers across various events, including concerts, comedy shows, community festivals, plays, dance showcases, and children's programming.
- Notable headliners included Buffalo Tom, who performed their first-ever hometown show in Medfield to a sold-out audience of 1,000 attendees.
- Bellforge's programming drew significant attention from regional media, with *The* Boston Globe featuring an in-depth story on our journey and future plans.
- Attendance reached close to 7,000 guests.
- Artists of color comprised 30% of our performers.
- BIPOC-owned businesses represented
 30% of our food vendors.
- We welcomed guests from 25 states and
 381 unique zip codes.







IN MEDFIELD, MUSIC WILL FILL THIS EMPTY SPACE

An arts center is taking shape on the grounds of a former state psychiatric hospital, with outdoor concerts in store until those plans reach fruition

BY JAMES SULLIVAN GLOBE CORRESPONDENT MEDFIELD — In the fall of 2020, at the height of the pandemic, the Coolidge Corner Theatre hosted a special drive-in screening of "Shutter Island" in this Norfolk County town. The location was apt: Martin Scorsese's 2010 thriller, which starred Leonardo DiCaprio, was filmed in part on the abandoned grounds of the former Medfield State Hospital.

With more than two dozen buildings on 87 acres, the hospital campus had approximately 2,300 patients at the height of its occupancy. By the time it closed in 2003, just 200 remained. In recent years, the only people making use of the space, about a 40-minute drive outside Boston, have been dog owners and power walkers.

Last summer, however, more than 10,000 people visited the vacant, boarded-up campus. They gathered on the lawn next to Lee Chapel, the centerpiece of the former psychiatric hospital, to hear live local music.

Those shows drew their audiences by little more than word of mouth. This summer, though, the team that has come together to establish the Bellforge Arts Center expects to produce a full slate of concerts, including bookings already confirmed with Buffalo Tom, the exuberant saxophonist Grace Kelly, and a first-of-its-kind festival curated by Boston rapper Cousin Stizz. All events, including upcoming Pride and Juneteenth celebrations, can be found on the Bellforge website.

They're also gutting and refurbishing the chapel and the nearby infirmary. Within a couple of years, the chapel will become a live music venue with a capacity of 325. The infir-BELLFORGE, Page G6






A canvas for creative place-making

Bellforge's creative place-making leverages our unique assets to develop a destination setting where people and art belong. A vibrant cultural hub, Bellforge is a welcoming space that prioritizes community. Access to art is a pillar of our mission, central to our foundation and strength.

Our programming promotes inclusivity and collective experiences, fostering social and artistic connections through live music, theater, dance, wellness initiatives, and children's activities that celebrate both legendary acts and new voices. Bellforge Arts Center is writing a unique story that harnesses dual powers of preservation and modernization, providing opportunities that bridge the past, present, and future in exciting ways.

- Distinctive, out-of-the-box programming is a hallmark of Bellforge concert and festival presentations. Our signature 2024 events included The Rat Reunion, celebrating the 50th anniversary of the opening of The Rathskeller, Boston's iconic punk rock club that attracted major bands like The Police, The Ramones, and Talking Heads in its heyday. The Rat Reunion built on the success of our Great Scott pop-up which honored another legendary Beantown music venue and a special homecoming show by Buffalo Tom, one of the most beloved and enduring alternative rock bands to come out of Boston.
- Bellforge supports independent artists
 and elevates emerging talent. Our weekly
 Summer Sounds series provides live
 performances that cultivate community
 spirit and reinforce Bellforge's role as a
 gathering place for artists and audiences.
 Our FieldFest event also amplifies our
 dynamic local music scene, showcasing
 artists from the Bellforge Triangle of
 Boston, Worcester, and Providence.


- Bellforge children's events have become community-favorite traditions, with a focus on imaginative self-expression through music, magic, and more. From the annual Fairy Walk to Fun at the 'Forge, these family-friendly programs create an enchanting sense of wonder that captivates all ages.
- A celebratory Locally Grown summer concert series and day-long festival highlight the finest in locally sourced food, drink, and music, while offering a glimpse into Bellforge's future ambitions. Our multi-phase approach to the development of Bellforge buildings and programming ultimately aims to encompass a culinary arts center and revitalized agricultural fields.
- Bellforge fosters understanding and empathy through creative collaborations that promote community engagement and acceptance. In partnership with Medfield Together, the annual CultureFest celebration joyfully honors our area's rich diversity of traditions, artwork, music, and food. This season, Bellforge also partnered with Women in Music Boston – an organization dedicated to promoting industry equality - to present singer-songwriter Liz Longley. Annual Bellforge Pride and Juneteenth celebrations help us deliver on our commitment to inclusion and representation through the arts.



Anatural community

The 87-acre campus overlooks the Charles
River and features open fields, mature trees,
rolling hills, and beautiful vistas. Guests
experience the arts and nature while enjoying
the grounds, walking paths, and access to the
"outer Emerald Necklace" of Eastern
Massachusetts's 230-mile Bay Circuit Trail. In
this multi-sensory setting, the center invites
exploration and discovery and forges
connections with each other and the land.
The Bellforge also adds vital programming
and rehearsal space to the region's cultural
landscape.

- The Garden Continuum designed beautiful flower boxes near the outdoor stage, and volunteers planted 6,500 daffodils.
- Medfield Foundation youth leaders painted benches surrounding the concert and festival seating, while other placemaking enhancements included an Eagle Scoutcreated labyrinth, planters, and seating.
- Bellforge collaborated with the Medfield
 Public Library on a campus art installation
 that features original poems by community
 members.
- Plans include the restoration of 10 acres of agricultural land for food production, with a healing garden that acknowledges the ancestral land of the indigenous Nipmuc and Massachusetts tribes.




Join us on this journey


